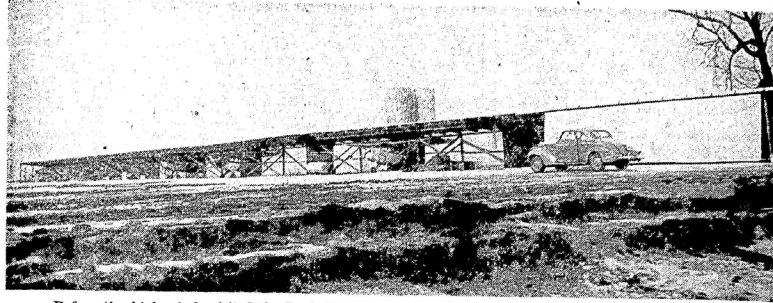
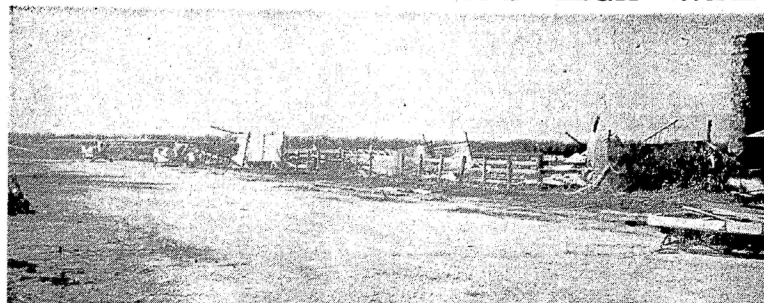


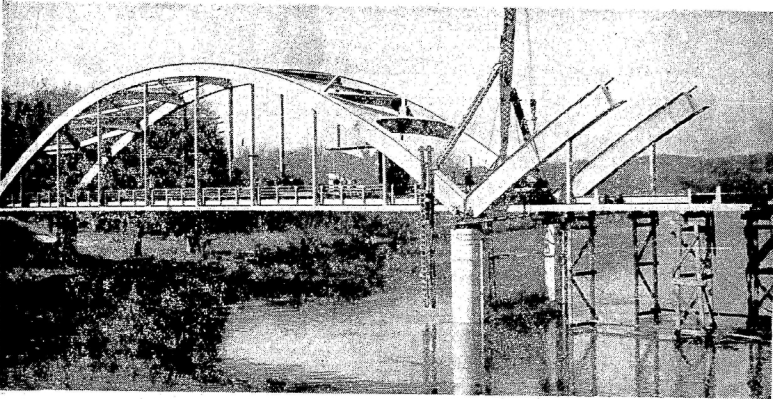
ROCHELLE AIRPORT SUFFERS SEVERE DAMAGE FROM LAST SATURDAY'S HIGH WIND

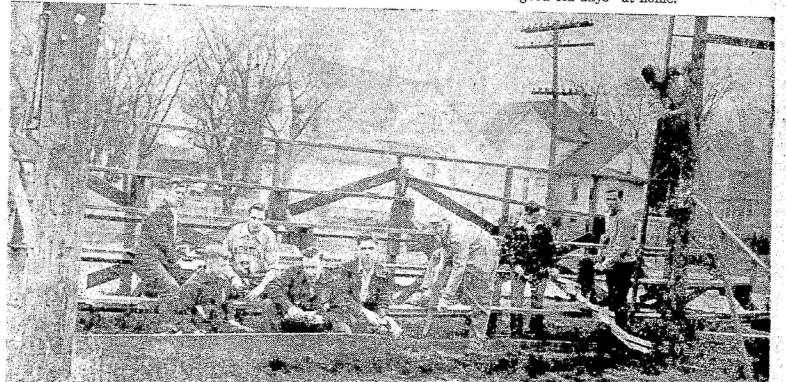

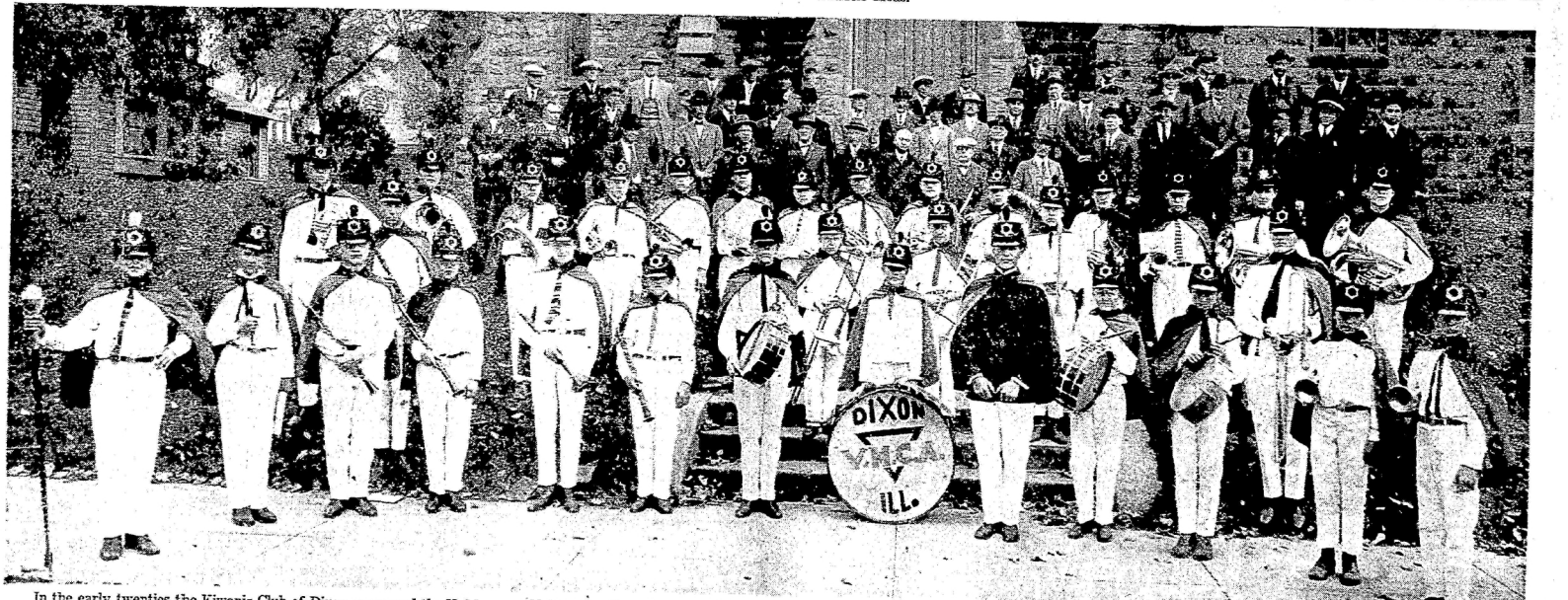
